Kids today are lucky. We have a lot more freedom when it comes to clothing for one thing. For them sneakers were made for gym class, and they didn't have many technologies. Today we can watch whatever we want on TV. The person I interviewed was nine years old when the TV came out. She said they only had three channels. We have it much easier than kids used to. Dianna Coakley said in her opinion the easiest chore was washing clothes on the washboard, and that would hurt! We, however can use washing machines.

Dianna Coakley was born on May 22, 1946. Life then was very different from today.

They had to change their clothes as soon as they got home from school, and they had to walk or ride their bikes everywhere they went. In school, they weren't allowed to speak unless spoken to. Girls had to wear dresses and they mostly packed their lunches. There was no open enrollment.

Dianna said outside of school she liked to play 'Chutes and Ladders' and 'Candyland' with her grandma, and with her friends she played jump rope and jacks. They especially liked to play

'marbles'. In fact in 5th grade, people called her the marble champion! Clothes were different also. Dianna said she and her friends always wore plaid dresses with black and white saddle shoes, And of course the clothes always had to be ironed. They didn't go out to eat. Instead Mrs. Parr- Dianna's mother cooked their meals at home, Dianna said that every Sunday they'd have her personal favorite food, fried chicken. For a snack she liked what they called a 'poor man's sandwich'. It was made of bread and ketchup. The Parr family listened to the radio a lot. When it came to T.V. they liked to watch 'Mid-western hayride', 'Ed Sullivan' and of course the news.

This is a childhood story that Dianna remembers. Because during this event she was embarrassed. Every weekend while her parents played cards with the adults in the neighborhood, the children played outside with each other. The Parr family was visiting Dianna's Aunt Tess in southern Ohio. She did something bad so her mother embarrassingly scolded her. Then her dad took her outside to give her official punishment. Mr. Parr told Dianna to sit on the porch step and not move until he told her she could. He forgot he told her to sit there and went to town with his uncle. Her Aunt Tess tried and tried but could not get the stubborn child off the porch step. Dianna's father and uncle returned three or four hours later to be greeted by the scene of Aunt Tess still trying to get the child off the porch step. Then her dad was embarrassed because he had forgotten and left her there.

Dianna was a senior in high school during the Vietnam War. During that time she went to school half-day, and worked the other half of the day for Dr. Murphy. one particular day they had the body of a soldier from the war. He had been brought to their office to be X-rayed because his parents wouldn't accept his body, and the only way to surely identify him, was to take X-rays and compare them to the ones he took before he went into battle. Dianna's friend

Marge was the x-ray tech at the time, and Dianna had to help her. She said it was horrifying, mostly because Marge's son was in war at the time. The Vietnam soldier was the son of the couple who would not accept his body. Dianna will never forget the event.

Despite all the changes from 50 years ago to now, there are some things that will always be the same. Kids are one of these things. Kids like to have fun whether it's 'Marco Paulo' or a computer game. They still hate chores whether it's using the washboard or taking out the trash. They still love having friends and hate getting yelled at. They still make mistakes and learn from them. They still celebrate holidays. They like music whether it's pop, rock, rap, or classical. They still have a favorite food and color. Some kids still hate sports, other kids still like sports. Kids in a special way will always be the same. Whether they were born in the 1940's or were born just this summer kids will be kids.

Most little girls had their hair cut with bangs across their forehead. Next, food was more home-cooked. Every Sunday Cynthia's mother would cook roast with green beans, potatoes, peas, and other vegetables from her grandfather's garden. In addition, kids played outside twenty four-seven. The children didn't have tablets and phones to play, so they would have gone outside and rode bikes or played a game of kickball with the neighborhood's kids.

Remembering back to her childhood, this is a story Cynthia will never forget. It was a beautiful Sunday morning, and her two eldest sisters had decided to each have a few friends over. Cynthia was eight, and her two older sisters were obsessed with The Beatles. The Beatles were a very popular boy band, and it just so happened that this Sunday, The Beatles were going to be on American television for the first time ever. Cynthia's sisters' friends arrived shortly before The Beatles would be starring on The Ed Sullivan Show, and they all gathered

excitedly on the living room couch, each with a small bowl of popcorn. They all chatted vigorously as Cynthia and her second-youngest sister spied on the teenagers. Eventually, The Ed Sullivan Show popped up on the television screen. Cynthia and her other sister began to become frightened as the girls started to squeal like little, baby, piglets. As soon as the band began to speak the teenagers began to jump on the couch, scream, point, cry, and even pull their own hair out. The craziness scared the two youngest because they didn't understand the older ones' actions. Eight year old Cynthia and her scarcely-older sister ran down the hallway, frightened, by what they didn't know was excitement. Later that Sunday afternoon, after the visitors had left, Cynthia's mom enthusiastically explained to them what had happened and why.

Cynthia will always remember the day that John F. Kennedy was assassinated on November 22, 1963, Dallas, Texas. John F. Kennedy was fatally shot by a sniper while traveling with his wife Jacqueline, Texas Governor John Connally, and Connally's wife Nellie, in a presidential motorcade. Cynthia was outside on the playground for recess when the teachers called the kids inside the building of East Elementary in Mount Vernon, Ohio. She, with all of the other disappointed kids, entered the building in a hurry. The first thing she saw when she walked through the doors was their principal yelling at Cynthia's second grade class to get to their classrooms. Shortly after she had sat down in her proper classroom, the principal ran in and shouted, "John F. Kennedy has been shot! The president has been shot and is pronounced dead!" All of the teachers started to cry hysterically. But, being only eight years old, Cynthia and

her classmates did not understand the sadness of the teachers. All they knew was that they would get the day of his funeral off of school. So, that day Cynthia and her classmates went home from school early. When the day of the funeral came, Cynthia's parents made her watch it as all of the neighborhood's kids played outside cheerfully.

Even though many things have changed over time, kids have stayed the same. First, kids have always had an education. Although we learn with much more technology today, such as ipads, laptops, and computers, we still learn just like they did sixty years ago. We also both have friends that we like to spend time with and hang out with. They could even go to the movies with their friends just like we can. The last thing that kids sixty years ago and kids now have in common is that we both like to play sports such as basketball and baseball. Although they didn't have organized sports for girls like we do now, they still enjoyed playing in the driveway or backyard. That is how kids have stayed the same over the past sixty years.

This paragraph is dedicated to Ronald Carr. He is 75 years old and was born April 16, 1939 in Radnor, Ohio. Now he lives in Prospect, Ohio across from the Prospect Dairy Bar. He worked at the Marion Power Shovel for 40 years from 1957 to 1997. He worked in an office and his job was to order the metal, aluminum, and iron. Now he works as a custodian for my church the Prospect United Methodist church. That is a biography about my Grandpa Ronnie.

The story my grandpa told me is when he got his drivers' license. He got it 2 weeks after he turned 16. Ronald was nervous when he took the written exam and got into the car for his driver's test. Ronald had passed the written exam and then he got in the car and was very nervous. Ronald tried to concentrate and not make any small errors. Ronald was very careful when turning corners and kept his eyes on the road trying not to hit anybody. Ronald. did pass the test. That is the story my grandpa told me.

The historical event my grandfather told me is not one you would think of off the top of your head. He told me about the time the Marion Power Shovel in

1965, created the crawler that is used to haul rocket ships. It took 3,200 men 5 years to make the crawler. The first rocket it held to launch was the, "Apollo Saturn V".
