They had to walk to school or they could take the bus. Parents didn't take them to school because a lot of them didn't have cars. Her bus driver was a 16-year-old student. They didn't have computers to help with their work. The clothing was different from today too. They were handmade, not store bought. The women and girls only wore dresses. They were plain with no design. Men wore bib jeans overalls or pants. Norma only had two dresses that she would rotate wearing each day. In addition food was homemade. They raised their own animals for meat. They would have to slaughter and clean their food to eat it. They had no restaurants. Next kids have to make their

own entertainment [music, games]. They played Hide n Seek and baseball. There were no school activities. Grandma Winders listened to music on the radio they had no I-pods or CDS. There was no television. On Saturdays you could go to the theater and watch 1 movie. And reading the bible was an activity also.

A story Norma will never forget happened one summer. Norma remembered making cream, which is butter. She was the only one who had the chore of beating the cream. One day she was putting it off and playing around hesitating, because she hated the job. Her mom yelled "NORMA ALLEN YOU BETTER BEAT THAT BUTTER NOW!" So she sat down in rocking chair with the jar and began singing. She only remembered looking down and the jar broke in her hands. The glass had cut her leg and there was blood everywhere. She was scared to tell her mom. She didn't want whooped with a switch. Her sister saw the glass break and told her mom. She had to get stiches from doctor. They numbed her leg, so it was painful. That was the last time she ever had to turn butter as cream.

Norma will never forget WWII. The World War 2 began in 1939. The World War 2 ended in May 1945. The WWII was the most Widespread war in history. The war in Europe ended with an Invasion of Germany by the Western Allies and the Soviet Union culminating in the capture of Berlin by Soviet and Polish Troops in the subsequence German in conditional surrender on 8 May 1945.
